## Wildfire Readiness & Fuel Reduction Management

The RCDTC has been helping local communities create defensible space since 2010. Staff can help you plan a fire management strategy by providing chipper services, creating a Community Wildfire Protection Plan, or writing necessary CEQA documents for fuel reduction treatments. ## Habitat Restoration

Under the guidance of the Tehama East and Tehama West Watershed Management Plans, the RCDTC carries out many habitat restoration and monitoring activities such as; fish passage and spawning improvements, updated fencing and water feature protections, noxious weed eradication, vernal pool monitoring and meadow encroachment.

## Mobile Irrigation Lab

Free irrigation system evaluations for agricultural growers. Measurements of distribution uniformity (DU) and application rates are calculated in addition to recommendations and tips for system improvements and scheduling. This program services growers in Tehama, Shasta, Butte and Glenn Counties.
